

THE PERFECT PRELUDE WITH STUNNING VIEWS


GARDEN HALL & BILLIARD HALL



The lower floor is ideal for receptions to mark the prelude or opening of a function as well as – as separate event area – wedding and family celebrations and smaller banquets. Furthermore, it offers space for marriage ceremonies, presentations, exhibitions and lectures. In association with the Mediterranean style south terrace, the lower floor is also particularly popular in the summer.


A BREATHTAKING VIEW

SOUTH TERRACE



Directly in front of the Garden and Billiard Hall on the lower floor, the South Terrace offers stunning views across the river Elbe and the Dresden skyline up to the hilly range of the Eastern Ore mountains on the horizon. In fine weather, the terrace, complete with garden furniture, tables and parasols, is the ideal place for receptions, memorable summer parties and even marriage ceremonies.

A GLITTERING SETTING CROWN HALL & SALONS



On the upper floor is the sumptuous Crown Hall. With its unique ambience and exceptional acoustic, the building's largest room offers a glittering setting for exclusive banquets, receptions, balls and chamber concerts. In the side wings are six adjoining salons which are all connected with one another in one vista with a view of the beautiful Elbe scenery as well as access to the palace park via the east terrace.

A PALACE BUILT OUT OF LOVE


SCHLOSS ALBRECHTSBERG



When Prince Albrecht of Prussia (1809 – 1872) settled in Dresden in 1850 he was following his heart.

The palace, built for him on the slopes of the river Elbe, is to the present day regarded as a significant Neoclassical building in Dresden and far beyond. It has been owned by the city of Dresden since 1925. After extensive renovation work, the palace today offers a representative setting for exclusive occasions.



A PRUSSIAN CASTLE IN THE SAXON STATE CAPITAL

With the marriage to his second wife, Countess of Hohenau, which did not befit his social status, Prince Albrecht of Prussia had to look for a new residence outside Prussia. Through the wife of his chamberlain, Baroness von


Four landscapes were created which were crossed with swung paths leading over bridges and a viaduct, past artificially created ponds, rocks and a waterfall. Before the completion of Schloss Albrechtsberg, the neighbouring Villa



Stockhausen, he acquired the land and commissioned the building of the palace between 1850 and 1854. The Prussian court and master builder and architect Adolf Lohse, a student of Schinkel, designed the plans for the building. The gardens were designed by Prussian landscape gardener Eduard Neide and realised by court gardener Herrmann Sigismund Neumann.

Stockhausen was also completed. Built as a residence for his chamberlain, it initially served Prince Albrecht and his wife as an abode for a year before they settled in Schloss Albrechtsberg.
